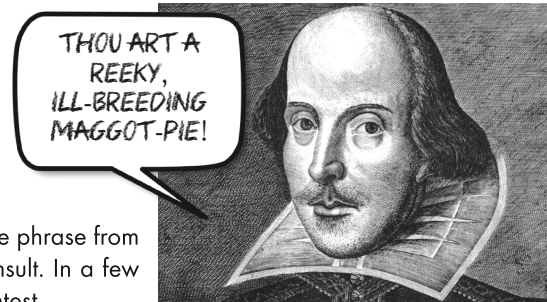


SHAKESPEAREAN SLAM
